Planting for Bushfire Safety



Planting day 4th October - the site is clear of weeds and ready for planting with native grasses and vines selected to provide a natural fire break to protect the houses. Last January, O'Grady Street neighbours Alan & Heather #40 and Nathalie & Brian #38 started the daunting task of restoring the forest behind their houses (Zone 15) with the removal of masses of Singapore Daisy and the high fire risk Guinea Grass. Six huge compost piles were required to manage the volume of weeds removed.

With the 50mm of rain this week it looks like we will have about a 90% survival rate with this planting and we have already had our first flowers on the Bower Vine Pandorea jasminoides.

Thirty one neighbours and friends from Arafura, Azania, Lathi and O'Grady Streets worked together to dig holes, plant and mulch while other neighbours contributed morning tea, tools and tank water to this valuable community effort.
