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Lizards	
Agamidae <i>Physignathus lesueurii</i> Eastern Water Dragon	 The table contains two photographs of an Eastern Water Dragon. 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Legless Lizards	
Pygopodidae <i>Lialis burtonis</i> Burton's Legless Lizard Size: 62cm Distinctive long sharp wedge-shaped snout. Feed on small reptiles.	

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Snakes

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Colubridae

Dendrelaphis punctulata

Green Tree Snake, Common Tree Snake

Harmless. Feeds on frogs and small animals.



Elapidae

Cacophis squamulosus

Golden Crowned Snake

Not considered dangerous. Crowned snakes rear their heads, flick their tongues and attempt to look dangerous. Have weak venom, tiny mouths, short fangs and a general reluctance to bite. (Queensland Museum Fact Sheet – Crowned Snakes)



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Elapidae

Demansia psammophis

Yellow-faced Whipsnake

Venomous – not considered dangerous to adults - treat using normal snake bite procedure.

Fast moving - preys on lizards
